Introduction



This document is about **National Lottery** funding. And how to apply for a grant. **National Lottery** funding is money that can help support arts projects.



Covid-19 has been bad for the arts. Stay at home rules meant lots of projects got cancelled.



The arts need to change how they do things. To build a better future for the arts.



We want to support projects that have good ideas to make the arts stronger in the future.



We want to support arts projects that make life better for people in Wales.

People we want to support



We want the arts to bENgle for everyone. This is very important to us.



So we will give lots of thought to **equality**, **diversity**, and **inclusion** when we give out this funding.



Equality means treating everybody fairly.

Diversity means including people with different backgrounds, such as black, Asian and minority ethnic people. It also means including people from poorer areas. And people of different sexualities.



Minority ethnic people are people who live in places where most of the other people are a different race.



Sexuality is about who a person fancies.

Inclusion means everyone can take part.

Projects we want to support



There are lots of different types of projects we want to support. Some examples are:



Projects that think of new ways to enjoy the arts.
 Especially after Covid-19.



 Projects that help arts business to change. So they are stronger in the future.



 Projects that help creative people to learn new skills.



Creative people means people who make things.



 Projects that bring more work and knowledge into Wales from other countries.



Projects that support Welsh speakers.



Projects that support Welsh or Welsh based creative people.

Who can apply

Businesses

Business application rules



There are rules for businesses applying for funding. You **must**:



- Be based in Wales. Or the UK.



 Have a business bank account with 2 people who can use it.



Have an up to date and legal Equal
 Opportunities Policy. This is a policy that makes sure you care about equality.



Not owe us money.



Not have any funding issues with us.



 If you are applying for more than 1 fund, you need to tell us.



- If you have more than 1 project, you must be able to manage them all.



• If your project includes working with children, young people, or vulnerable adults:

Vulnerable adults are people who need support in their day-to-day lives.



You need to have an up to date and legal
 Safeguarding or Child Protection Policy.



 You must have safeguarding procedures for all parts of your project.

Safeguarding policy or **procedures** means rules about keeping people safe.

Proof

 We will need proof in writing that you have safeguarding procedures.

Business set up



You need to be set up to do business properly. For example, you need to be a company or a charity.



You will need to send us documents to show how you are set up.



If you are not sure about your business set up, ask us for help.

You **cannot** apply for funding if:



You are a government department.



 You are a school. There are other grants for schools.

Individuals

Individual application rules



There are rules for individuals applying for funding. You **must:**



- Apply in your own legal name.



- Have a bank account in your legal name.



Be over 18.



- Live in Wales.

Already have experience working in the arts.



 Be able to show us some arts projects you have already worked on.

Individuals who cannot apply

You **cannot** apply if you:



Are a student.



• Owe us money or have other funding issues with us.



We cannot pay for your studies. But we can help you to access training so you can build a career in the Welsh arts.



Some businesses and individuals are not allowed to apply for **National Lottery** money.



But you can still apply. Just include a letter saying why you cannot have **National Lottery** money.



If you have a good application, we might be able to help you find money from somewhere else.

Your project

There are rules about what types of projects we will support:



Your project must be mainly in Wales.



Your project should add to work you already do.
 But not just be the same thing you normally do.



Your project should include working with other people.



- Your project should have a start and end date.



 Your project should be funded by some money from other places as well.



We will also check if you have thought about equality, diversity, and inclusion.



Like including Deaf people and people with hearing loss, disabled and **neurodivergent** people in your project.



Neurodivergent people are people whose minds work in different ways.

Accessibility needs



We want all arts projects to be accessible.

Accessible means something that is easy to get to or to use.



If you need help with **accessibility** please let us know.



If your application is successful, we can help with access support costs. This is extra money we can give you to support you throughout the project.



You can include **access costs** for your audiences in your application. For example, for Deaf people. people with hearing loss and disabled people.

About the funding



From April 2021 to March 2022, we have **£20** million to support the arts.

We want to support lots of different arts projects. Including:



 Projects that help people be healthier and feel better after the pandemic.



 Projects that help the arts get better and stronger in the future. Especially after Covid-19.



 Projects that help creative people to learn new skills and create new work.



 Projects that are more inclusive. Like getting more communities involved in the arts.



 Projects that help people in Wales to work with other countries.

Paying for yourself and your team



It is important that people working in the arts get paid properly.



Funding can pay for these costs. You must include these costs in your application.



These costs should be **industry standard**. This means you should pay people what they normally get paid in the arts.



You should not pay less than what the **government** says people should get paid.



You should also not pay yourself or others too much money. Unless you have a good reason for it. If you think you need to pay someone more than £5000 to work on your project check with us first.



If you are not sure what you should pay yourself or others, ask us for help.

Things we cannot fund



There are some things we cannot give funding for. These include costs for:



- Advice, finance, or legal fees.



• Your normal rent and bills.



Fundraising and promotion.



Promotion means work you do to help people know about your project.



 Things you paid for before we agreed to give you funding.



Term time projects with schools.



We normally do not fund food and childcare costs. But we might in special cases. Please ask us about this.


When to apply



For up to **£10 thousand** - you can apply anytime from May 2021.



There is no deadline to apply for up to £10 thousand.



But you cannot start your project until at least **6** weeks after you apply.



If you want to apply for **more** than **£10 thousand**, you must apply by the set deadlines.



You will find the deadlines on our website. You cannot start your project until at least **9 weeks** after your deadline.

The application process

Submitting your application



You will need to register to use our **online portal**. You might need some help with this.



The **online portal** is where you will fill in and submit your application.



We will check your application to make sure you should be applying for this funding.



We will check to make sure you are asking for the right amount of money.



If there are any problems with your application, we will let you know.



If you need help with your application, please contact us.

Assessing your application



If everything is okay with your application, then we will assess it.



Assessing means we will check it in detail.



We cannot give money to everyone.



So we must make sure your project is right for this funding.



If we decide to give you funding, we will send you an **Award Acceptance**. And we will explain to you what happens next.



If we decide **not** to give you funding, we will make sure you understand why.



How we use your information



We believe people have the right to see how we spend the money we have.

Because we are a public organisation we have to let people see who we give money to by law. This means some of your information may be seen by other people.

We follow a law called **GDPR (General Data Protection Regulations)**. This means personal information is not shared without your consent. Unless a law is broken.

GDPR decides how we store and use people's information.
